H.W. Grady; businessman

Herman W. Grady, who founded several Hartford businesses, died Tuesday at his Wethersfield Avenue home. He was 74.

He founded the Aetna Ambulance Co. of Hartford in 1946, co-founded the Hartford Ambulance Association and was a commissioner of the former Connecticut Ambulance Association.

During his business career in Hartford, he also founded the Aetna Limousine Service and Aetna Florist.

Before serving in the U.S. Navy in World War II, he worked for Aetna Insurance Co.

Grady was active as a volunteer with the American Red Cross for several years. He was also a life member of Disabled American Veterans, Chapter 12.

He was born in North Brookfield, Mass., but had lived most of his life in Hartford.

He is survived by his wife, Jean Smith Grady; two sisters, Aldora E. Rawlins of Hartford and Ethel G. Johnson of Worcester, Mass.; and several nieces and nephews.
